The Naum Theatre Istanbul's 19th century opera house

From the early 1840s until its destruction by a devastating fire in 1870, the Naum Theatre was Istanbul's imperial opera house supported by the sultans and host to the latest productions of famous works from the established repertoire by Bellini, Rossini, Donizetti and Verdi. Turkish music historian Dr Emre Aracı has meticulously pieced together a history of this remarkable and little-known opera house of the Near East in his recent book published in Turkey. In his talk Dr Aracı takes us on an imaginary tour behind the curtain and in doing so exposes the Ottomans' passion for European music and drama.
