PRINCE HARRY AT VIRGIN LONDON MARATHON 2012

There'll be a Royal bonus and an Olympian send-off for the runners in this year's Virgin London Marathon on Sunday 22 April. Legendary British Olympic medallist Dorothy Tyler will be this year's official race starter while Prince Harry of Wales will be the event's official 2012 trophy presenter.

Prince Harry, who became patron of the London Marathon Charitable Trust this year, will hand trophies to the first three finishers in the men's and women's races, and those in the men's and women's wheelchair events. He will also present prizes to winners in the Virgin Money Giving Mini London Marathon, races over the final three miles of the course involving young runners from across the country aged 11 to 17.





'We are delighted to have Prince Harry with us to present awards to our runners this year,' said Virgin London Marathon joint race director David Bedford. 'Prince Harry is a great supporter of the event and it is especially fitting to have a Royal presence during the Queen's Diamond Jubilee year.'

The 36,000 runners will also be given a memorable send-off on their 26.2-mile journey through the capital when Dorothy Tyler sets them on their way from Blackheath. Tyler won silver medals in the high jump at the Berlin Olympic Games in 1936, when she was only 16, and at the London Games in 1948, making her the only woman to to win Olympic athletics medals before and after the Second World War. She also competed at the 1952 and 1956 Olympic Games.

THIS IS LONDON veteran runner Bob Mundy, has been training hard for the Marathon and is hoping for a time of around 4 hours. So, hit the streets anywhere between Greenwich and The Mall on Sunday 22 April to enjoy the elite athletes, fun runners and everything in between – just don't miss it!

Anyone who has been unable to secure tickets to the Olympic Games this year can now see Olympics Gold Medallist Robin Cousins star on the West End stage as Billy Flynn in the musical CHICAGO at the Garrick Theatre from 17 July, 10 days ahead of the Olympic Games Opening Ceremony. He will be in the show until 8 September, the day before the final day of the Paralympics.

Robin won Gold in the 1980 Winter Olympics at Lake Placid, New York, also picking up the coveted BBC Sports Personality of the Year the same year. This was followed by a successful career as a professional skater, before finally being forced through injury to hang up his skates in 2000, when he became a full-time choreographer.

Prior to Robin joining CHICAGO, David Bedella has returned to the role of Billy Flynn for a limited season until 12 May, a role David originally played at the Cambridge Theatre early last year.

Now the most successful Broadway export ever and the world's longest running American musical, as well as the West End's longest running revival, the multi award-winning musical CHICAGO opened at the Garrick Theatre on 7 November 2011.







WALTON BELSHAZZAR'S FEAST AND MORE TEMPTING DELIGHTS

Music to whet any appetite will come to the Queen Elizabeth Hall, Southbank Centre on Saturday 28 April (19.30), when two of London's finest choirs, Ealing Choral Society and the London Orpheus Choir will be joined by the Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra to present a feast of music, conducted by Dr Jonathan Williams. Also in the line up are the acclaimed soloists, soprano Emily Rowley Jones and baritone David Stout.

More than just an amuse-bouche for the feast ahead, the concert will begin with Debussy's wonderfully evocative Prélude à 'L'Après-midi d'un faune'. This is a piece whose individuality, intensity and influence enable it to stand along side any other. It is considered by many to be the awakening of modern music.

The next course will be Poulenc's Gloria, criticised at the time for being irreverent, but exuberant with freshness and vivacity. It is the work of an older man shrugging off the up-to-date in favour of a style grounded in his early experiences playing the piano in a bar. It is imbued, with ravishing effect, with insight and maturity.

And finally, we have the sumptuous Walton's Belshazzar's Feast. In contrast to the intimacy and sensuality of Debussy, it is dramatic, unrestrained and richly orchestrated with rhythms and harmonies reflecting Walton's interest in jazz. It tells of the 'writing on the wall' at the Babylonian king's sacrilegious feast, the fall of his kingdom and the release of the Jews from exile.

THE ELYSIAN SINGERS IN AMERICAN CLASSICS AND SHOW SONGS

The Elysian Singers, one of the UK's top chamber choirs, will be returning to St Martin-in-the-Fields, Trafalgar Square, on Tuesday 1 May at 19.30, with an American-themed programme of classical and popular music, including settings of Negro spirituals, music by Eric Whitacre, and show songs including Gershwin's 'Summer time', Fats Waller's 'Ain't Misbehavin', and Rodgers & Hart's 'Blue Moon'

The programme ('The American Connection') is the brainchild of conductor Sam Laughton, and explores the ways in which the culture of the United States became such an enormous influence on 20th century music. For example, the English composer Michael Tippett included Five Negro Spirituals in his wartime oratorio 'A Child of Our Time'. Another choral classic from the 1940s is 'Alleluia' by Randall Thompson.

More recently, Eric Whitacre has become the United States' most celebrated choral composer, and the choir will be performing his Three Songs of Faith, based on poems of E E Cummings. America's biggest impact on the Western classical tradition has probably been the minimalism of Philip Glass and Steve Reich; and this has influenced Jonathan Dove's 'The Passing of the Year', a song cycle in

which the choir are joined by pianist Rupert Egerton-Smith.

The Elysian Singers close with a tribute to the greatest Americanism of them all: musical theatre. The choir will perform arrangements of show-stopping (and foot-tapping) classics from the Great American Songbook, including Gershwin's 'Summer time' and Harold Arlen's 'Somewhere over the rainbow'.

The concert will take place at the beautifully restored St Martin-in-the-Fields, a church which has one of the finest choral acoustics in the country. And with 'The American Connection', the Elysian Singers will put a swing in your step!

HOWARD SHELLEY PERFORMS WITH LONDON MOZART PLAYERS

Acclaimed chamber orchestra The London Mozart Players will be joined by its long-time collaborator, celebrated British pianist Howard Shelley, who in a rare treat conducts three orchestral greats, as well as performing solo, in a concert in the heart of Westminster as part of LMP's brand new residency at St John's Smith Square.

One of the most prominent English pianists of his generation, Shelley gave his first concert on BBC television at age 10, before going on to create a remarkable career that includes several hundred broadcast concerts for the BBC, becoming one of the best-known pianists ever to the British public.

Shelley plays the celebrated Grieg piano concerto in his LMP programme, one of the most famous works in the piano repertoire, written at a time when Grieg had re-immersed himself in his native Norway's folk music — its characteristic inflections can be heard in every melody. In 1867, when writing the concerto, Grieg was in love with his cousin, Nina Hagerup, who he was to marry that year. Something of his state of mind can be heard in the tender, radiant, yearning and instantly recognisable first movement.

Shelley also conducts the orchestra in Beethoven's overture to the tragic drama Coriolanus. Brahms' dramatic first symphony, a labour of love written over 21 years, completes the programme.

The London Mozart Players is one of Britain's finest chamber orchestras, committed to engaging internationally renowned soloists that in the 2011/12 season also included violinist Tasmin Little, rising star pianist Cordelia Williams, and Viennese violin master Benjamin Schmid.



MONICA MASON – A LIFE WITH THE ROYAL BALLET

A wonderful exhibition currently on view at The Royal Opera House features costumes and photographs from the unique career of Monica Mason and her 54 years with The Royal Ballet. From her early days as a member of the corps de ballet in 1958 through to her decade as Director of The Royal Ballet, the exhibition is a comprehensive overview of her exceptional achievements within the Company.

The earliest costume on view is for one of the six princesses or fiancées in *Le Lac des cygnes*, which Mason first



wore on 4 December 1958, five months after joining the company, aged 16, as its youngest member. Another is her costume for The Chosen Maiden in Kenneth MacMillan's *The Rite of Spring* in 1962.

Other costumes reflect the range of repertory Mason danced including classical roles in *The Sleeping Beauty* and *Raymonda Act III*, Frederick Ashton's *Birthday Offering, Cinderella* and *Enigma Variations* and twentieth century classics such as Bronislava Nijinska's *Les Biches*, Jerome Robbin's *Dances at a Gathering*, Hans van Manen's *Adagio Hammerklavier* and MacMillan's *Song of Earth*.

The costumes are supplemented by a rich display of over 80 images which span the whole of her career with The Royal Ballet from 1958 to the present. The photographs illustrate the many roles she danced as well as highlighting her work behind the scenes. Monica Mason has lent material for the exhibition including a full length portrait of her as a dancer in practice clothes by June Mendoza, a set of scrapbooks of press cuttings lovingly compiled by her mother, Sue Fabian, and photo albums showing Mason and her Royal Ballet colleagues on overseas tours.

There is a unique tour of the exhibition most days at 11.00 which adds background detail to the exhibits, interesting anecdotes and first hand stories of Monica Mason's career with The Royal Ballet. Book in person at the Box Office or call 020 7304 4000.



They also help out in the Great Kitchen, where food is prepared for State Banquets. As they make jam tarts, they see the enormous mixer that can whisk 500 eggs at once. The pair play with the corgis and learn about The Queen's Diamond Jubilee.



LA PORTE DES INDES

If someone asked you what you most liked about Indian food, and then what you liked least, would your answer be a) lots of variety and subtle spicing and b) food so hot it makes your eyes water?

Say yes, and I say you will be pleased to discover La Porte des Indes. For in addition to its self-consciously exotic setting – real palm trees in pots, a waterfall running down one wall, a mezzanine with iron balustrade and lots of painted elephants – this West End eatery has a Franco-Indian theme, which seems to tone down much of the chilli beloved in other Indian restaurants.

It is a mildly amusing tangent in the many stories which make up India's culinary history. Pondicherry was the one French colony in India, dating from the nineteenth century, and some of its classic dishes have been blurred together in a delicious confusion of East and West.

Highlights among the starters are the 'Demoiselles de Pondichéry', grilled scallops sitting in the shell with a creamy sauce – spiced up by saffron





and garlic. Rasoul are curry 'puffs' stuffed with lamb and peas, quite traditional but served with a sweet Creole sauce. Parsee fish is another winner — fillets of Sole steamed in banana leaves, which the waiter was careful to point out should be removed (how thoughtful!), made tangy inside by mint and coriander chutney.

So far, so delicious. The only real disappointment of the meal was the platter of vegetarian starters served to the companion. Apart from a crunchy chard and water chestnut pakora, the little assembly of things – made no doubt from gramflour, ground rice, lentils etc – was bland and dry, and some looked like a cross between an overbaked Victoria sponge and a child's jam sandwich.

This was a Road to Damascus moment: the companion decided there and then that she was no longer a vegetarian and called the waiter over to

change her order to the menu maison. Thankyou very much.

When I had stopped laughing — though I wanted to seem sympathetic — we enjoyed together tastings of Barra lamb chops — British lamb marinated in caramelised onions and garam masala, 'poulet rouge', a shredded chicken in red spices which was wonderful, and a smoked aubergine dish which was every bit as tasty as Middle Eastern versions.

Meanwhile a small party of Arabian ladies was brought some sort of pudding with candles in it, to a chorus of Happy Birthday by the staff and much applause from the other diners. This happened a few times. It's a party sort of place: perhaps too much so on occasions, we observed, as a group of Scandinavian men, who may or may not have been record producers, or footballers, or any profession which tolerates long hair, became quite drunk.

Well! We supposed they were enjoying themselves a lot in a foreign city. La Porte de Indes is so close to Marble Arch, it must have quite a following from international visitors staying in the smart hotels nearby. From our side we were satisfied with a bottle of Gewurztraminer – perhaps one of few occasions when you can enjoy such robust wine and lots of masala chai, the spicy tea which is clearly home made here. Count on spending £50 each and you will feel you had a feast. Or try the new 'light lunch' at £19 per person including a glass of freshly squeezed juice. Wholesome and exotic.
